SELECT NOTES

Please pardon the tardy arrival of Madbury Musings this fall. Distribution has been held up to accommodate the late publication of that other document you await almost as eagerly: your property tax bill. The Town had to wait for the State to set the official tax rate. This process was delayed somewhat by changes in the State's rate setting process. Hopefully this will go more smoothly next year and tax bills will be in your hands by Nov.1 as usual. Please note that your payment is due within 30 days from date the bill is sent. The late billing means later payment receipts for the Town which will in turn necessitate extra careful scrutiny of our cash flow at the end of the year. Prompt tax payment is always appreciated at Town Hall!

Since the last issue of Musings we have enjoyed (except June) a pleasant summer. The Town's recreational facilities have been well used. The new soccer fields at Tibbetts Field were put in service for the first time this year. If you haven't visited Tibbetts Field, stop by to take a look. As you view the facility, envision the parking lot full and the fields covered with excited children and their families: this is the Saturday morning scene, one repeated at Demerritt Park as well.

The Recreation Commission has been busy with plans for a fitness trail to be added to Tibbetts Field. Work will begin presently and continue in the spring. The ½ mile track will run around the perimeter of the fields with various fitness equipment at stations spread along the course.

Town roads have, as usual, received a good deal of attention during this maintenance season. Routine work included some shoulder grading and the fall

mowing. Long Hill Road has been repaved. PSNH completed extensive tree trimming in parts of Town. That activity prompted attention to some problem trees in Town rights of way. PSNH only deals with trees affecting their lines. The Town can deal with problem trees in the public rights of way. (Trees on private property are the land owner's responsibility.)

TAX BILLS - As of this printing, the tax rate has not been set. PLEASE CHECK THE DUE DATE ON THE TAX BILL AS LATE FEES ARE ASSESSED.

WINTER PARKING ORDINANCE will be in effect on November 1 and will remain in place until April 1. It prohibits parking on streets and roads during snow plowing and removal operations. Any vehicle parked will be towed at the owner's expense. Placing of snow in the town road right of way during personal snow removal is prohibited as well. Your cooperation will help keep the roadways open and safe for all travelers.

been the rebuilding of Freshet Road from Route 108 south to Portsmouth's water treatment facility. Building projects at that Portsmouth facility have generated a good deal of heavy truck traffic lately. That project is winding down with little more heavy traffic expected. With that road-pounding finished, we could rebuild the road without risk of having it promptly wrecked again. The road has been reconstructed with a new roadbed and extensive improvements to shoulders and drainage.

Madbury enjoys the collaborative support of the City of Portsmouth in the Freshet Road project. Recognizing their very significant impact on this road, Portsmouth will contribute \$50,000 to the project. (Did you know that more than 50% of the Portsmouth Water District's water comes from Madbury?)

Speaking of water, an ad hoc committee made up of members of the Planning Board, Zoning Board, Water Resources Board and Selectmen has recently worked with Madbury's planning consultant to review and improve our Aquifer Protection Ordinance. This important part of our Zoning Ordinances is designed to protect the water resources so critical to our neighbors in Portsmouth, Dover and Durham, all of whom draw water from Madbury aquifers. Watch for public notice for hearing(s) on the proposed ordinance changes to be on the town warrant in March.

Speaking of aquifers, Schnitzer Steel Company is proposing a significant reconfiguration of their operations involving additional construction at their site on Route 155 (above an aquifer). They are completing an extensive application process with the State. As part of that process they have scheduled a public hearing on Wednesday, November 13, 7pm at the Town Hall. Once they have satisfied the State, we anticipate an application for Site Plan Review by the Madbury Planning Board. That application process will also include public hearings.

One more water topic: The Water Resources Board conducted water tests at the Town's 5 wells to check for arsenic (and other contaminants). The EPA drinking water MAXIMUM recommended concentration for arsenic was reduced to 0.010 mg/L in recent years. Arsenic, like radon, is a common naturally-occurring problem in drilled wells in NH. The cemetery irrigation well is substantially above this drinking water threshold but skin contact and irrigation use are not concerns at the levels found. Safety Complex well has arsenic above the drinking water limit too. Bottled water is already used there. The Library well was measured at 0.011, just above the limit. It will be retested before treatment is decided. Other town wells tested near or lower than this long term consumption threshold. Some additional testing is planned. These test results are consistent with regional experience with arsenic in well water and do not suggest a local source.

Briefly:

Colette Clickman retired this summer after several years of much appreciated service to the Town as the Selectmen's Administrative Assistant. She has been succeeded by Eric Fiegenbaum who is already well known to many in Town for his extensive volunteer service to the Town.

The ORCSD School Board would like to appoint a Madbury representative for the Budget Advisory Committee. If you are interested contact the Superintendent's office.

Extensive mosquito testing this year didn't turn up any evidence of EEE or West Nile Virus in Town.

Recreation Commission

We are very excited to announce that work on the Tibbetts Facility Fitness Trail has begun!!! LandCare was awarded the contract for the actual trail work and broke ground in November. The trail will be approximately one half mile in length with plans to add an additional loop towards the cemetery in the future. The trail surface will be short cut grass and will make its way around the perimeter of the soccer fields. Our plans are to start the installation of the fitness equipment as soon as possible in 2014.

An upgrade to the lower baseball field at Demeritt took place this fall and was funded by ORYA. Madbury Recreation contributed by increasing the capabilities of the irrigation system. The soccer field at Demeritt was offline this season to give the grass a chance to recover. Play will resume in the spring.

ORYA held a Grand Opening Ribbon Cutting Ceremony called "Soccer Fest" at Tibbetts Fields this fall. It included food, games, prizes, and of course plenty of soccer. It was attended by many and was a huge success. If you missed it this year, I am pretty sure they will be holding the event again next year. I have to say, "Our Fields Look Great!"

A resident heron makes use of the baffle curtain which hangs near the dam in the Bellamy Reservoir. The curtain's purpose is to assist in the mixing of water before a portion heads off to Portsmouth's drinking water treatment plant. Recently, Portsmouth discovered that someone made a cut in the curtain. Portsmouth will be adding addition signage to identify and explain restrictions. Please be reminded that the Bellamy Reservoir is a public drinking water supply, and while the region benefits from the recreational activities it provides, there are local, state and federal regulations that exist to protect it as a drinking water source.

A volunteer driver program is being launched to help elderly and disabled residents of Madbury, Lee, Durham, and Newmarket get to medical appointments when they cannot drive themselves. As the New Hampshire population continues to age, the need for transportation services in rural areas will continue to grow.
