Wentworth Trust

The Town recently received the first disbursement from the Carleton and Dorothy Wentworth Trust. The trustee approved these allocations:

\$12,000 - total in scholarships to three Madbury students.

\$14,000 - to the Fire Department for the first phase of replacing breathing apparatus equipment

\$8,000 - to the Recreation Commission toward the Tibbetts Field walking trail fitness stations

\$500 - for a large format scanner for use by Town departments, boards and affiliated groups

\$500 - for the Madbury Historical Society for proper storage supplies

\$3,000 - toward the Powder Major Conservation Project.

TOWN OFFICE NEWS

TAX BILLS - The tax rate has been set and the due date for tax bills is December 1, 2016. There is a requirement to assess late fees.

TRICK OR TREATING in Madbury will be held on Sunday, October 30th from 5:00-7:30 PM.

GENERAL ELECTION DAY is Nov. 8. Polls are open from 7am to 7pm.

MADBURY TRANSFER STATION will close for the season after the session on Saturday, November 19, 2016.

WINTER PARKING ORDINANCE will be in effect on November 1 and will remain in place until April 1. It prohibits parking on streets and roads during snow plowing and removal operations. Any vehicle parked will be towed at the owner's expense. Placing of snow in the town road right of way during personal snow removal is prohibited as well. Your cooperation will help keep the roadways open and safe for all travelers.

Water, or not

We are aware of a few shallow well failures in town recently due to the ongoing drought. Emergency potable water is available from the spigot at the Town Hall. Residents with well problems are welcomed to contact the Town Office regarding wells but we can offer neither expert advice nor public funding for well repairs or replacement. Private water supplies are just that: private. By the way, owners of rental properties have a duty to provide safe and adequate water supply for tenants.

Spending your tax money

You have received this newsletter with your tax bill. Are you wondering what the Town does with all that money? You probably already know that the biggest bite goes to the School District. What's left is divided amongst Town, County and State. The

Town portion of the property tax increased by 2% this year.

The Selectmen started developing the Town's 2017 budget in September. It will be finalized between now and Town Meeting. We aim to limit budget increases to 2% this year in order to maintain current service levels and keep taxes under control. Note that the tax rate doesn't exactly track budget changes. Other factors affect tax rate too.

If you would like to know more about how the Town uses your tax money, attend the Town's budget hearing. Watch for date and time posting.

Conservation Commission

We hope folks in town are aware of the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests undertaking to preserve land likely used by Chief Moharimet and the Abenaki people as planting grounds, and later by the "Powder Major" John Demeritt. It is told that he secreted gunpowder that was used at the Battle of Bunker Hill.

Along with support from Durham, Lee and Madbury, the project will preserve nearly 300 acres in the three towns. It protects a portion of the Oyster River, wildlife habitat, working forests and fields, and supports public recreation and educational resources.

More information can be found at the Society's website: forestsociety.org. While there has been great support from all corners, they still have a ways to go. Consider a donation, if you are able.

On a less positive note, over the last couple years several single track mountain bike trails have been constructed on the Hayes Farm Conservation Easement. The Farm is private property with a limited right for public access. The rogue trails were built without the permission of the landowner. The Commission will be joining with the landowner in moving to close these trails.

The building of trails without landowner permission is disrespectful of the generous access afforded by the easement, and jeopardizes future conservation efforts.

The trails to be closed are located between the long existing trails that parallel the Bellamy River. An authorized trail map can be downloaded at the town website.

We would appreciate the community's cooperation in this effort.

Water Resources Board

As winter approaches, there are continued extreme drought conditions on the Seacoast, causing low reservoir, groundwater and stream flow levels. September precipitation in the Seacoast region was 1.76 inches, half the historic average. This is the twelfth consecutive month with less than average precipitation - 65% of the normal amount over the last year. Because of this, in September the monthly mean stream flow in the Oyster River was 94% lower than the 30-year mean flow.

Even with autumn rainstorms, it is unlikely water sources will substantially refill until after the snowmelt during the spring of 2017. Some residents with shallow wells are experiencing water shortages. Widespread shortages may occur if rainfall does not replenish our lakes, streams and groundwater supplies before winter weather sets in.

Major indoor uses of water include showers, sinks, toilets, and washing machines. Besides limiting their use, water-saving fixtures and appliances can use 25-50% less water than older devices and appliances.

If you have a shallow well, you might try spreading out the timing of your water use so the well has time to replenish. It could be wise to address deficiencies before the winter months, and be prepared with safe alternate sources of supply.

Rebecca Rule, New Hampshire's foremost storyteller and humorist, has been collecting tales about New Hampshire for nearly two decades. Her latest book (and first picture book for children) is *The Iciest, Diciest, Scariest Sled Ride Ever*, illustrated by Jennifer Thermes. Other books include: *Moved and Seconded: NH Town Meeting, the Present, the Past, and the Future*; *The Best Revenge* (named one of five essential New Hampshire books by New Hampshire Magazine); *Could Have Been Worse: True Stories, Embellishments, and Outright Lies*; *Live Free and Eat Pie: A Storyteller's Guide to NH*; and *Headin' for the Rhubarb: A New Hampshire Dictionary* (well, kinda). She writes regularly for UNH Magazine and hosts an interview show, the NH Authors Series, on NHPTV. She

recently received an honorary doctorate from New England College for storytelling and contributions to New Hampshire literature.

This presentation is free and open to the public.
